JANUARY HLC MEETING - By Steve Schneider

Hillcrest leaders said goodbye to one Neighborhood Team Leader and hello to our new Hollywood Police Department liaison at our HLC meeting on January 18th. The meeting was held at Community Center II.

Some HPD officers are part of a community program that assigns a team leader to different Hollywood neighborhoods. They spend time getting to know the local leaders as well as residents to help assess situations and the specific needs of community and neighborhoods.

Officer William Hammaker spent three years as our Neighborhood Team Leader, and he did a stellar job. He was thanked for his service at the meeting by the building presidents and board members. He remains with the department, but in a different position. We met his replacement, **Officer Matthew Rodriguez**. He officially started in his new position on January 23rd.

Both officers discussed a variety of issues important to residents with the HLC attendees. The information below comes from comments made at the meeting, and in follow-up interviews conducted after the meeting. Items of concern included car break ins and thefts, the proper number to call for different kinds of help, and officers' response to calls that involve residents with mental issues. Residents also learned about the recent rash of thefts of catalytic converters from under cars, and some ideas how to combat parking lot crimes which include the use of license plate readers that can be stationed in building parking lots.

The Hillcrest leaders also took a moment to recognize **Betty Merk**, **Hillcrest 15** for the outstanding job she did representing our interests during the Pulte Parkview at Hillcrest project. Even as a snowbird, returning to Canada every year, Betty never missed a beat. Every resident's question was answered and with the help of several Hillcresters who were her "boots on the ground", she followed up on every aspect of the project until the very end.

Our District 6 City Commissioner, Idelma Quintana was in attendance and updated leaders on recent happenings at City Hall.

Cars in Hillcrest Parking Lots. Both officers agreed that auto thefts are a big issue in our area. Better lighting in parking lots can help, as can making sure your car doors are locked. Of course, it also helps for residents to be alert and notify the police if they see something suspicious.

Numbers to Call. If you see a crime in progress, call 911. You can also call police at **954-764-4357** for non-emergency situations. The number to call when you want to reach a specific department at the Hollywood Police Department is **954-967-4636**. Call this number if you want to speak to a specific unit, such as traffic, which can handle speeding problems on Hillcrest roads. The more calls a unit gets, the greater the chances are that Hillcresters will get the response they want.

New Number for Potential Mental Health Crisis. Hillcresters can now call 988 if they want police to respond to a possible mental health emergency. Marilyn Lieberman, Hillcrest 15, brought up the topic. She said the number is up and running but not fully staffed yet. In response to a question, Lieberman and others learned that many officers are now trained in evaluating if a person is experiencing a mental health crisis. Based on law, cops have escorted people to a hospital when an emergency is clearly defined, although police must see evidence that the person is a danger to himself or others. Lieberman is an advocate for treating mental health problems and providing services to people in distress.

Theft of catalytic converters from under vehicles. Mike Newman, from Hillcrest 26, shared information with residents and officers. He said this is a big-ticket item for criminals. The thieves can get under the car and remove the car part in five minutes or less. And the converters can cost up to \$3,000 to replace. Additionally, **Robert Ducker, president of Hillcrest 5**, said the President's Council handyman had his catalytic converter stolen while he was working in Hillcrest during the day. In short,

crooks search out these valuable parts day and night. You can also buy a plate to protect the catalytic converter on your car. It costs anywhere from \$300 to \$600.

Nuisance Noise. Amarilis Rodriguez, the property manager for Parkview at Hillcrest said her community sometimes experiences problems with loud noises. Generally, though, community leaders have more power to handle this problem than the police. However, **Hollywood Code Enforcement** has rules about loud noise, so you can call them at **954-921-3061**. You can get more information at the city website by searching noise ordinance.

Cameras and License Plate Readers in Parking Lots. Cindy Abraham, Hillcrest Leadership Council secretary, said high quality cameras and good lighting can help deter parking lot crime. And Selina Pirkau, Hillcrest 4 president, noted license plate readers can also provide some security. Both pieces of equipment, of course, do not guarantee that crime will go away.

Pot smoking in buildings. Society is evolving when it comes to smoking marijuana. Medical marijuana is legal. However, it can also affect one's neighbors if it is smoked on balconies or intrudes into other units. Therefore, building leadership probably will have to deal with this issue rather than the police.

Children riding bicycles and causing traffic problems. Police will ask the children to stop so they can speak with them. But if the kids take off, officers won't chase them, lest the chase result in someone getting hurt while fleeing.

City Commissioner Idelma Quintana updated us on the issues raised at the City Commission meetings. A recent meeting dealt with proposals to redevelop the city owned Orangebrook Golf Course, which is across Park Road from Hillcrest.

According to Quintana, officials will stage another meeting to review the proposals, which were reduced to four, from six initial proposals. But she said the issues are complicated because the specifics of each proposal have changed multiple times. In addition, there are many factors to be considered, including but not limited to, the financial benefits for the city and the proposer's ability to secure funding.

In terms of financing, competition to use the city owned property has benefited us. The Commissioner said the proposers initially wanted to use some of our bond money to redevelop Orangebrook. But now, as the proposals continue to change, all have promised to use their own money only.

What's more, Quintana said she takes seriously what residents have to say and that too is part of her consideration. Local groups and nearby residents have voiced support for one of the remaining proposers, called E2L. All bids include a nature path, a 36-hole golf course, a new clubhouse, a hotel and some form of housing. E2L proposes 200 units of senior housing, and the City of Hollywood is also considering a proposal that offers more plentiful housing units that will face Pembroke Road.

Inside Hillcrest has also received some comments on the golf course. **Richard Fortier, from Hillcrest 8**, wrote: "Please, sustain the **E2L** proposal for our ORANGE BROOK City propriety."

And **Ken Walrond, Jr., from Hillcrest 18,** offered a more general perspective. "To all who love this Golf Course (there are many of us) know what a treasure it is/was etc......l've been playing there since the late 1980"s...."Big Jack" Tournaments and other events have been Great Memories...I just hope that our City Leaders remember the "Hillcrest Golf Course" departure!!!....Have noticed over the years playing Orangebrook that the biggest problem was how poor the course was maintained.....the landscaping was horrible especially near the railroad tracks and Pembroke Road...Select either the East or West course and make the other a Park where the trees and lakes can be upgraded - just an idea."

Good news! Hollywood is testing an On-Demand "Fixed Stop" Shuttle Service for Hillcrest and surrounding neighborhoods. While residents and visitors east of 26th Avenue have enjoyed Sun Shuttle rides since 2019, I am thrilled to announce that we now have an opportunity to prove the need for similar shuttle services for residents west of 26th Avenue. The City of Hollywood, in partnership with micro-transit provider Circuit, will launch a two-

month trial in March. The "Ride Circuit" Community Shuttle will operate 6-days a week, Monday through Saturday, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on a pre-determined route. A 12-person passenger van will pick-up passengers from 11 high-volume destinations within the service area from I-95 to 441/SR7 between Johnson and Washington Streets. Fares will be set at \$2.00 per person per ride, however passengers who get on board the shuttle and head to where it is already going, can ride for free.

A phone number and App will soon be available for residents to request a ride. Once the request is accepted, passengers will go to a nearby pickup/drop-off location where they will catch the shuttle. Passengers can get off at any of the pre-determined drop-off locations along the route. The route is still being finalized but will likely include Hillcrest, City Hall, Tri-Rail Station, Hollywood Plaza, CVS, Memorial Regional and Memorial Regional Hospital South, Walmart Super Center, New England Mobile Home Park, Aldi and Zinkl Park.

Be on the lookout for details and tell your neighbors about this service. The extent to which residents make use of this trial will inform whether a future permanent shuttle service is made available to residents. I look forward to the result of this trial and to hearing your thoughts about it. ¡Buenas noticias! Hollywood está probando un servicio de transporte a pedido para Hillcrest y los vecindarios circundantes. Los residentes y visitantes al este de la 26 avenida han disfrutado de los viajes en Sun Shuttle desde el 2019, me complace anunciar que ahora tenemos la oportunidad de demostrar la necesidad de servicios de transporte similares para los residentes al oeste de la 26 avenida. La ciudad de Hollywood, en asociación con el proveedor de microtránsito Circuit, lanzará una prueba de dos meses en marzo. El servicio de transporte comunitario "Ride Circuit" funcionará 6 días a la semana, de lunes a sábado, de 10:00 a.m. a 2:00 p.m. en una ruta predeterminada. Una camioneta de pasajeros para 12 personas recogerá pasajeros de 11 destinos de alto volumen dentro del área de servicio desde la I-95 hasta la 441/SR7 entre las calles Johnson y Washington. Las tarifas se establecerán en \$ 2.00 por persona por viaje, sin embargo, los pasajeros que suban a bordo del transbordador y se dirijan a donde ya se dirige, pueden viajar gratis.

Un número de teléfono y una aplicación pronto estarán disponibles para que los residentes soliciten un viaje. Una vez que se acepta la solicitud, los pasajeros se dirigirán a un lugar cercano de recogida y entrega donde tomarán el servicio de transporte. Los pasajeros pueden bajarse en cualquiera de los lugares de entrega predeterminados a lo largo de la ruta. La ruta aún se está finalizando, pero probablemente incluirá Hillcrest, City Hall, Tri-Rail Station, Hollywood Plaza, CVS, Memorial Regional y Memorial Regional Hospital South, Walmart Super Center, New England Mobile Home Park, Aldi y Zinkl Park.

Esté atento a los detalles e informe a sus vecinos sobre este servicio. La medida en que los residentes hagan uso de esta prueba informará si un futuro servicio de transporte permanente estará disponible para los residentes. Greetings Hillcrest Residents,

Costs are rising for everyone in Broward County, especially our seniors. Affordable housing in particular continues to be a persistent crisis in Broward County. The housing crunch is driving up costs for residents of all backgrounds and will have lasting impacts.

Last month, the Greater Fort Lauderdale Alliance brought together experts, residents, elected officials,

community leaders and more for a large summit on housing affordability as part of the "Prosperity Partnership." The findings were concerning. 92% of Broward residents cannot afford the median home price to buy. In addition, rents have increased by an average of 28.9% per bedroom in just the last year. Costs are even more difficult once childcare, transportation, and healthcare are included. In fact, studies suggest we are the most cost-burdened place to live in the entire country!

Too many of our Broward families, especially those with children and grandchildren, are cost-burdened and living with the impacts of high costs and lack of resources. The A.L.I.C.E. report prepared by the United Way is a new, innovative way of measuring economic difficulty beyond regular poverty metrics. It takes into account local costs and examines how it relates to available pay and resources. For the first time, the United Way has released an A.L.I.C.E. report exclusively focusing on children. It found that 56% of children in Broward County live in income-limited homes or poverty and are struggling to have their needs met. This is a concerning number, and an issue we must address diligently to preserve our future.

In moving forward, we will have to address the housing crisis in two ways – addressing the issue of housing stock by building more units in a sustainable way, and by creating first-time homeowner and other assistance programs to help families live in the units that already exist. The City of Hollywood has already taken the lead on first-time home ownership programs. This must be a top priority for residents, no matter their situation. We also must make the cost of childcare, medicine, and transportation more affordable.

If you know a family in need of immediate help, the Children's Services Council of Broward County has prepared the 2021-2022 Family Resource Guide. This annual guide is designed to help parents and families know what resources are available to help their children; from insurance to childcare to healthcare and much, much more, this guide has a comprehensive list of all the resources a parent might need. 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HIGHRISE BUILDINGS FIND ALTERNATIVE TO COMCAST

Four Hillcrest hi-rise buildings dropped Comcast recently. And replaced the communications giant with a couple of companies that are more cost-effective and generally got good reviews in an Inside Hillcrest survey.

As of this writing, Hillcrest 23 brought in Blue Stream Fiber, while Hotwire Communications now services Hillcrest 27. Like Comcast, these two businesses offer tv, internet and phone services, although associations have discretion on what type of package to get for the building. Individual unit owners can sign up for any services the association doesn't purchase. Hillcrest 22 also signed up with Blue Stream and Hillcrest 24 contracted with Hotwire.

Many Hillcrest buildings are ending their contracts with Comcast in the coming months, so we sent out a survey to residents of 23 and 27. All comments appear with initials only, as promised.

BLUE STREAM FIBER

LP, Hillcrest 23: We are extremely happy with the signal but find it best to reboot the router weekly.

JD, **Hillcrest 23**: I am very satisfied with the service. With Comcast the wiring in the building was very old and the signal strength coming into my unit on the 10th floor was very weak and despite numerous technicians coming out there was nothing they could do. I found Comcast very expensive for a combo of phone cable and internet. Also, as a Snowbird on a seasonal plan there were insufficient internet options to run a security camera and Nest thermostat to monitor our unit in off season.

JR, Hillcrest 23: Blue Stream Fiber re-wired our whole building with Fiber optic cables, and we have tv and internet service all year round with the fees built into our HOA fees. It costs everybody less money. I think it's a no brainer. Some older folks did complain since they don't use internet etc. but we must be forward thinking. With technology ever so changing and so many still working from home, fiber optics are the way to go.

OM, Hillcrest 23: We are much happier with Blue Stream. Friendly service people. minimal interruption of service. The odd time it requires a reboot. It does freeze up when recording at times.

MF, Hillcrest 27: Considering everything, I like Hotwire better. - I pay nothing per month. I receive the basic internet (plenty of speed for me)

- The StingRay music channels do not really compare to the same genre I used to have on Comcast. Such a small detail for the price savings

- I had to call for support a time or two, and I always got a rep on the phone. No waiting in line for someone to pick up the phone. And those reps spoke English, where you can understand them.

- The installation of the fiber optics was very swift and does not show all over my walls. I have 2 TVs, both work from the same cable in the living room. No more heavy cable running around the baseboards.

Portability allows eligible property owners to pay less property taxes at their newly homesteaded property by transferring all or a portion of the Save Our Homes (SOH) savings from one Florida property to another Florida property within the strict time frame allowed by law. If you qualify, Portability will reduce your property's assessed value, resulting in tax savings this year and possible tax savings in future years depending upon the market value of

your home each year.

Portability applies to both upsizing and downsizing in property value, based upon specified formulas. Portability may be used an unlimited number of times and may be used for moves to anywhere within Florida. Portability does not require you to sell your previous home, but merely that the Homestead at your prior property be fully abandoned.

Most homeowners will have already applied for Portability when completing their Homestead Exemption application. Portability is only reflected on our website's property record page the first year for which it is approved.

Effective tax year 2021, a property owner who applied and was approved for Homestead Exemption for 2021 is eligible to apply for Portability if the property owner held a Homestead Exemption at a previous Florida home in one of the three previous tax years. Example: if you established a new Homestead in tax year 2021, you must have held Homestead at your prior residence in tax year 2020, 2019, or 2018 in order to take advantage of potential Portability savings.

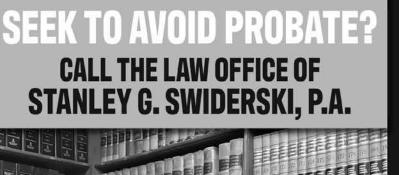
PLEASE NOTE: Homesteads established in tax years 2008 through 2020 are eligible for Portability if the property owner held Homestead Exemption on a property in the previous two tax years (the law was changed in 2021 to allow three years before any Portability savings expired). Example: you established Homestead on your property in 2014 but forgot to file for Portability, you may be eligible if you held a previous Homestead at another Florida property in tax year 2013 or 2012.

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UPDATE ON MORTGAGE RATES – by Gary Crowder

Mortgage rate headlines were wildly varying over the last few days. We went from "Rates back under 6% for the first time in months" to "Mortgage rates jump to the highest levels in months". What is going on with rates?? Fed Chair Jerome Powell spoke on Wednesday February 1st. His comments about slowing the pace of Fed rate hikes due to good inflation (dis-inflation) signs was welcome news. He further stated that the disinflationary process has started. He was cautious about declaring victory on inflation, but his commentary helped mortgage rates. 30-year fixed rate averages dropped to just under 6% as a result.

A day later, a blockbuster jobs report came out (Non-Farm Payrolls). Expectations were for a number of approximately 200k new jobs. The report showed that 571K jobs were created. This massive beat on the number caused mortgage rates to shoot back up to 6.45% on a 30 year fixed rate average. That's a big swing. Good economic news is usually bad for mortgage rates and bad economic news is usually good for mortgage rates.

To put this all into perspective, mortgage rates have improved from the Mid 7's to the Mid 6's since Mid-November. The massive rate increase in the past year was primarily due to Inflation. As inflation goes, mortgage rates will follow. The fact that inflation numbers have been improving has led the Fed to suggest they won't need to hike the Federal Funds Rate as high as they once believed. The Federal Funds rate is the main tool the Fed has to control inflation and they have not been shy to use it. This should cause unfortunate economic pain. It should also lead to more unemployment, yet it has not. The Feds intent is to first, lower inflation. This is the primary goal. They are also looking to lower consumer spending, which should help lower inflation. Their expectations are also for an uptick in unemployment. This has not happened. Hence the great news from Jerome Powell and inflation reports helped rates to go lower and the subsequent jobs report made them jump. I would expect these varying economic indicators to continue in the near term.

If the Fed believes they can continue to raise the Fed Funds Rate without causing anticipated economic pain (ie. Higher unemployment) than they will likely take that path to be sure that inflation comes back under control. Mortgage rate volatility will likely continue as we see mixed economic news. A swing of .5% in mortgage rates in one day is far from "normal". Going forward, the belief is that at some point unemployment will increase. At that point, provided inflation remains under control, we will see another drop in rates. Until then we will likely see rates hover in the current low to mid-6 range.

Consumers should find solace in knowing that rate refinances remain a tool they can use as rates going forward are anticipated to drop. The adage "Marry the house, Date the Rate" remains alive and well. The Fed comments from last week mentioned that they may begin to drop the Fed Funds Rate as early as late 2023. Most experts are predicting lower rates in 2024. How much lower remains the question.

JANUARY 2023 STATE OF THE MARKET REPORT

After a soft January, February picked up a bit in Hillcrest. At present we have 21 active listings, thirteen 2-bedroom units and 8 one-bedroom units. Sixteen went under contract; eleven 2/2 and five 1/1/1 and only five closed. Two of the closed sales were our listings.

Days on market are still fairly short. The three active listings that have been on the market over 90 days have all taken price reductions but just not enough. It may be a seller's market, but buyers have plenty of time to study the market and know value. Not many are brave enough to see an overpriced listing and offer fair market value. They are usually worried that an unrealistic seller who takes a lower offer will not be easy to work with. When we work with buyers, we do the initial consultation to really find out what they are looking for and why. Many times there is nothing currently on the market so we plug in their criteria so that they will receive an autonotification right away for any properties that fit what they are looking for. Then of course we try to be one of the first to see it. In a market where cash is still king, we also teach strategies that give our finance clients a chance to win the bidding war. Bidding wars for condos are pretty rare these days. We see them happen more for single-family homes.

Of the 16 pending sales during the month of January, every single one of them went under contract within 90 days. Biggest selling points? Open kitchens, remodeled bathrooms, nice flooring and paint, newer A/C, water heater and appliances, and the one thing that we can't change – the view. There are two units available for rent and 1 rented during January.

JUSTIFYING MY PEANUT BUTTER COOKIE RECIPE – by Cindy Abraham with a little help from the Interweb



Pure maple syrup is not only high in antioxidants, but every spoonful offers nutrients like riboflavin, zinc, magnesium, calcium, and potassium. According to Helen Thomas of the New York State Maple Association, maple syrup has a higher concentration of minerals and antioxidants, yet fewer calories than honey.

Peanut butter is loaded with so many good, health-promoting nutrients, including vitamin E, magnesium, iron, selenium, and vitamin B6. Research shows that people who regularly eat nuts and nut butter, including peanut butter, are less likely to develop heart disease and type 2 diabetes. However, use all-natural peanut butter or make it yourself.

Peanut butter is rich in a variety of nutrients — but it's also rich in calories and fat. While the healthy fats in peanut butter are nutritious, you should consume them in moderation to avoid unwanted weight gain or potential health problems. Commercial peanut butter brands often have added sugars, oils, and fats.

Sweeteners made with monk fruit don't impact blood sugar levels. With zero calories, monk fruit sweeteners are a good option for people watching their weight. Unlike some artificial sweeteners, there's no evidence to date showing that monk fruit has negative side effects.

Some evidence suggests that the mogrosides in monk fruit contain good-for-you antioxidants. Commonly found in plant foods, antioxidants fight off free radicals that can lead to health problems like cancer and heart disease.

Stevia may have antioxidant properties, but research shows that the mogrosides in monk fruit extract have much more powerful antioxidant and anti-inflammatory properties.

Almonds are rich in valuable nutrients for your body, like magnesium, vitamin E, and dietary fiber. A single serving of almonds makes for a nutritious and filling snack. Almonds have calcium and phosphorus, which improve bone health and can protect you from fractures.

Almond flour is a great alternative to wheat-based flours. It is incredibly nutritious and provides many potential health benefits, including a reduced risk of heart disease and improved blood sugar control. It is also gluten-free which makes it a great option for those with celiac disease or wheat intolerance. If you are looking for a lowcarb flour that is rich in nutrients, almond flour is a great choice.

Chia seeds and Flax seeds both provide a wide array of nutrients including fiber, plant protein and omega-3 fatty acids. Chia seeds have anti-inflammatory properties while flax seeds contain more soluble fiber than chia seeds, which may make them slightly more effective at

reducing hunger and appetite. Chia seeds provide a better source of calcium with 18 % of the Daily Value per two tablespoons.

We are trying very hard to reduce our sodium intake and of course the first things to look at are food labels. The difference in the amount of sodium in Italian bread crumbs vs. panko took me by surprise. And so did the amount of sodium in a lot of canned food and any readymade sauces like spaghetti sauce. Oy vay as they say in Portugal.

I have a hard time sacrificing taste for healthy. But we did switch to turkey meatballs once I found a recipe that was REALLY good, which is the recipe that was in last month's IH. But then I looked at my favorite pasta sauce in a jar and realized that the amount of sodium was over the top.

I have made homemade sauce before, and I think I shared the recipe. It was good but time-consuming, so I didn't make it again. I googled homemade spaghetti sauce and found this simple recipe figuring it will just have to do. I didn't realize it would be GREAT!!! And it was easier than saying Worcestershire 10 times real fast.

I bought low sodium tomato sauce (15 oz can) and had everything else on hand. I took 10 minutes to prep and 30 minutes to cook. The hardest part is chopping the onion!

Cook the pasta first so you have the 1 cup pasta water. I use the chickpea Penne which tastes great but has to cook a lot longer than regular pasta no matter what the directions say. Plus I add the pasta to simmer along with the sauce.

Dinner was wonderful. You can use Italian ground turkey sausage and/ or meatballs. I used both. Feel free to adjust measurements to your taste.

FAST, EASY, AND DELICIOUS SPAGHETTI SAUCE

1 lb. Italian ground turkey sausage Black pepper to taste ½ cup chopped onion 15 oz low sodium tomato sauce ¼ cup tomato paste 1 tsp Italian seasoning

- 1 TBS dried parsley flakes
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1/4 tsp red pepper flakes
- 1 TBS Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp sugar or 1/2 tsp monk fruit

1 cup pasta water (save a cup of water when you drain the pasta)

Fresh oregano or basil leaves

1. Season sausage with pepper

2. In a large skillet, add the sausage and chopped onion and brown. There shouldn't be much grease to drain using turkey sausage.

3. Add tomato sauce, tomato paste, Italian seasoning, parsley, garlic powder, crushed red pepper, Worcestershire, and sugar to skillet.

4. Stir well and bring to a boil. Add the pasta water and stir again.

5. Reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes. You can add some oregano or basil leaves if you want.

Note the article on the opposite page. That is my long-winded way of telling you why you need to make these cookies! So fast and easy! I saw chunky peanut butter with chia and flax seeds on sale at Aldi and then realized I already have both types of seeds in the cupboard, so I added my own. All the ingredients below are way cheaper at Aldi than anywhere else. Thanks to my Canadian neighbors I had plenty of maple syrup, but I have made them so often I also bought Vermont Maple syrup which is also great (thanks to my Vermont neighbor, Bill for his guidance!).

I also googled what is the difference between baking soda and baking powder? Baking soda and baking powder can produce cookies with different textures. Baking soda is typically used for chewy cookies, while baking powder makes for a lighter fluffier cookie. This recipe calls for baking soda but one day I will try baking powder just to see what the difference is.

EASY PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES (only makes 12 so I double the recipe)

1⁄4 cup maple syrup 1⁄2 cup peanut butter (creamy or crunchy)

1/4 cup almond flour

1 tsp baking soda

1 tsp pure vanilla extract

1 TBS chia and flax seeds (optional) Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees. Mix ingredients and scoop onto lined baking sheet 2 inches apart. Press down with fork sprayed with nonstick. Bake for 10-12 minutes or until lightly browned.

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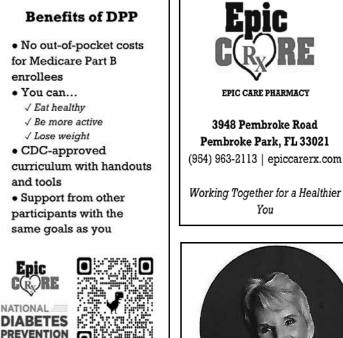

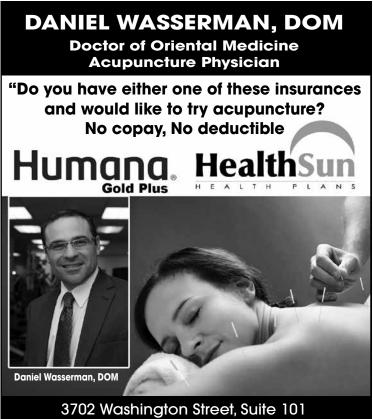
